Democratic Amendments to the Republican 2013 Budget Resolution

Summaries, text, and vote tallies

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Democratic Amendments to the Republican 2013 Budget Resolution

This week the House Budget Committee marked up the Republican budget resolution for fiscal year 2013 and approved it on a strict party line, with no Democratic support and two Republicans voting against it.

Democrats want to achieve long-term economic growth by making wise investments and steadily reducing deficits and debt, but not through the choices made in the Republican budget. It provides tax breaks to millionaires while ending the Medicare guarantee for seniors and sticking seniors with the bill for rising health care costs. It protects tax giveaways to big oil companies and other special interests while slashing investments in education, scientific research, and critical infrastructure. It rewards corporations that ship American jobs overseas while terminating affordable health care for tens of millions of Americans. It slashes Medicaid, cutting support for seniors in nursing homes, individuals with disabilities, and low-income children. It raises taxes on middle-income Americans to pay for additional tax breaks for the very wealthy.

Budget Committee Democrats offered a series of amendments that reflect America's priorities: investments to promote job creation, maintaining Medicare and the social safety net, and responsible deficit reduction through policy choices that ask everyone to pay their fair share. None of the amendments would have increased the deficit, and in fact, several would have reduced the deficit. All of the amendments offset any proposed spending by reducing unproductive tax breaks, including subsidies for big oil companies, egregious tax breaks such as tax deductions for corporate jets, tax loopholes that encourage the outsourcing of manufacturing and result in fewer American jobs, and additional tax cuts for millionaires.

Republicans rejected every Democratic amendment to reduce the deficit or change spending levels. Following is a description of the amendments. The Appendix at the end includes the text of each amendment and each roll call vote tally.

Health Care

No Medicare Vouchers – amendment #1 (Lead sponsor: Rep. Schwartz)

This amendment opposes any changes in law that would eliminate guaranteed health insurance benefits for seniors and people with disabilities under the Medicare program; increase costs for seniors and people with disabilities by establishing a Medicare voucher or premium support plan that provides limited payments to Medicare beneficiaries to purchase health care in the private health insurance market; or weaken the traditional Medicare program by diverting the healthiest enrollees into private plans and undermining the program's ability to control costs while offering

access to a broad range of providers. The Republican budget calls for transforming Medicare into a premium support or voucher program, where seniors would be given a fixed payment for the purchase of health insurance that would not keep pace with rising health care costs over time, forcing seniors to face higher premiums, eroding coverage, or both.

A **YES** vote protects the Medicare guarantee for senior citizens and persons with disabilities who rely on Medicare. A **NO** vote puts health care coverage for these populations at risk by refusing to disallow proposals that shift health care costs from the federal government to seniors and persons with disabilities by transforming Medicare into a voucher or premium support system.

This amendment was rejected, 20 No votes to 13 Yes votes, with only minority support. See Amendment #1 in the Appendix for the text and the roll call of votes.

Prohibit Medicare cuts to beneficiaries – amendment #2 (Lead sponsor: Rep. Castor)

This amendment expresses the Sense of the House on the need to retain the important new health benefits for seniors and disabled individuals provided in the Affordable Care Act – benefits that will be eliminated as a result of the Republican budget resolution's repeal of most provisions of the Act. The Act provides 50 percent discounts on brand-name drugs this year for Medicare beneficiaries in the Medicare Part D 'donut hole' coverage gap. The law completely closes the 'donut hole' by 2020. About 3.6 million seniors with high drug costs saved an average of \$604 in 2011, thanks to the Act. Affected seniors will save nearly \$2,400 in 2021. An estimated 32.5 million seniors and disabled individuals received one or more free preventive services through Medicare in 2011, such as mammograms and colon cancer screenings. Repeal of the Affordable Care Act will increase costs to seniors for these important services.

A **YES** vote supports the important new benefits for seniors and disabled individuals provided in the Affordable Care Act, including prescription drug cost relief. A **NO** vote supports repeal of the Affordable Care Act, risking seniors' health coverage and forcing seniors with high drug costs back in the donut hole where they must pay all their prescription costs.

This amendment was rejected, 21 No votes to 15 Yes votes, with only minority support. See Amendment #2 in the Appendix for the text and the roll call of votes.

Prevent severe cuts to Medicaid – Amendment #9 (Lead sponsor: Rep. Wasserman Schultz)

This amendment reverses the Republican budget's extreme \$810 billion in cuts to health care for seniors in nursing homes, people with disabilities, poor children, and other low-income people. The amendment restores this funding for Medicaid, and it is fully offset by eliminating or reducing tax deductions to the "Big 5" oil companies, egregious tax breaks, tax loopholes that encourage the outsourcing of U.S. jobs overseas, or additional tax cuts for millionaires. If these Republican cuts go forward, Medicaid funding will be cut by one-third by 2022. This level of

cuts will lead states to drop between 14 million and 27 million people from health care by the tenth year, according to the Urban Institute.

A **YES** vote maintains health care for millions of seniors in nursing homes, people with disabilities, and children. A **NO** vote puts big oil companies and additional tax cuts for the wealthy ahead of basic health care for the most vulnerable Americans.

This amendment was rejected, 21 No votes to 15 Yes votes, with only minority support. See Amendment #9 in the Appendix for the text and the roll call of votes.

Women's health -- amendment #13 (Lead sponsor: Rep. McCollum)

This amendment expresses the Sense of the House that Congress should not repeal the Affordable Care Act, taking away vital benefits, especially the Act's important protection against unfair discriminatory practices against women.

A **YES** vote on this amendment supports the right of all American women and, indeed, all Americans, to access the full range of health care services, and it supports the Affordable Care Act and other applicable laws that protect and further strengthen that access. A **NO** vote means supporting the repeal of the Affordable Care Act – which would allow insurance companies to continue to deny women insurance coverage and charge them more for pre-existing conditions, resulting in catastrophic outcomes for American women.

This amendment was rejected, 20 No votes to 14 Yes votes, with only minority support. See Amendment #13 in the Appendix for the text and the roll call of votes.

Women's reproductive freedom – amendment # 29 (Lead sponsor: Rep. Schwartz)

This amendment expresses the Sense of the House that no woman should be denied access to contraceptives. The Affordable Care Act ensures ongoing access to critical preventive services that enable women to make important personal choices about family planning without regard to cost burdens. A **YES** vote ensures women's access to preventive services, including contraceptive services. A **NO** vote supports repeal of the Affordable Care Act's provisions that protect the right of all American women to access critical health care services without regard to cost burdens, including care such as mammograms, pap smears, contraception, and coverage for screening services that enable early treatment and prevention.

This amendment was rejected, 21 No votes to 16 Yes votes, with only minority support. See Amendment #29 in the Appendix for the text and the roll call of votes.

Jobs

President's infrastructure jobs initiative – amendment #3 (Lead sponsor: Rep. Blumenauer)

This deficit-neutral amendment would add the transportation investments of the President's American Jobs Act to the budget. This would allow for an immediate infusion of \$50 billion for highway projects that will put people to work over the next few years and strengthen the transportation infrastructure that helps drive a strong economy. The increased funding for transportation infrastructure is offset by an equal amount of revenue from reducing or eliminating tax deductions to the "Big 5" oil companies, egregious tax breaks, tax loopholes that encourage outsourcing, or additional tax cuts for millionaires.

A **YES** vote on this amendment is a vote to create jobs and improve our nation's road, rail, and airport networks. A **NO** vote means favoring tax cuts for the wealthiest members of our society at the expense of creating jobs and repairing and modernizing roads throughout the country.

This amendment was rejected, 20 No votes to 16 Yes votes, with only minority support. See Amendment #3 in the Appendix for the text and the roll call of votes.

Adopt the Senate highway bill – amendment #4 (Lead sponsor: Rep. Bass)

This amendment would fit the provisions of the recently passed Senate highway bill into the budget. Passage of that legislation would allow highway projects to continue after the end of this month. Our highway programs have operated for more than two years on a series of eight temporary extensions, and Republican leaders are reportedly resisting the Senate bill while they push for provisions to increase oil drilling. The Republican resolution would also cut transportation spending nearly in half next year (46 percent below this year's level); this amendment would have eliminated those cuts.

A **YES** vote will allow highway projects and jobs to continue, end the gridlock, and give State highway officials and construction companies the certainty they need to hire workers for the spring construction season and plan projects for future years. A **NO** vote will cut transportation spending nearly in half and continue to hold highway programs and jobs hostage so that Republicans can pursue an unrelated agenda.

This amendment was rejected, 18 No votes to 14 Yes votes, with only minority support. See Amendment #4 in the Appendix for the text and the roll call of votes.

President's school modernization jobs initiative – amendment #25 (Lead sponsor: Rep. McCollum)

This deficit-neutral amendment provides \$30 billion in 2012 to create jobs upgrading at least 35,000 crumbling public schools, including elementary and secondary schools and community

colleges. The amendment is fully paid for by ending unnecessary tax breaks for special interests, subsidies for big oil companies, egregious tax breaks, or tax cuts for millionaires.

A **YES** vote puts hundreds of thousands of Americans – construction workers, engineers, maintenance staff, boiler repair, and electrical workers – back to work modernizing public schools while also creating an infrastructure that will help students learn and created a better future workforce. A **NO** vote means choosing to protect tax breaks for special interests while abandoning the many Americans looking for work and doing nothing to upgrade American schools to meet 21st century needs.

This amendment was rejected, 20 No votes to 15 Yes votes, with only minority support. See Amendment #25 in the Appendix for the text and the roll call of votes.

President's Veterans Job Corps initiative – amendment #5 (Lead sponsor: Rep. Kaptur)

This deficit-neutral amendment provides \$1.0 billion to establish a Veterans Job Corps, as proposed by the President. This initiative will employ at least 20,000 veterans over the next five years in projects to preserve and restore America's national, state, and local parks and other public lands. This increase is fully offset by eliminating or reducing tax deductions to the "Big 5" oil companies, egregious tax breaks, tax loopholes that encourage the outsourcing of U.S. jobs overseas, or additional tax cuts for millionaires. The number of veterans without a job has declined significantly over the last year, from just over 1 million to 777,000 last month. That is good news, but there are still too many veterans out of work.

A **YES** vote promotes jobs for veterans. A **NO** vote puts big oil companies and additional tax cuts for the wealthy ahead of jobs for America's veterans.

This amendment was rejected, 20 No votes to 17 Yes votes, with only one Republican vote of support. See Amendment #5 in the Appendix for the text and the roll call of votes.

Support a "Make it in America" agenda by insourcing jobs – amendment #8 (Lead sponsor: Rep. Pascrell)

This deficit-neutral amendment supports American jobs by establishing a 20 percent tax credit against expenses for U.S. businesses that return (or "insource") jobs and operations to the U.S., and denies tax deductions for U.S. businesses that outsource jobs and operations overseas.

A **YES** vote supports American jobs and businesses by providing new tax incentives to bring business into the U.S. A **NO** vote jeopardizes American jobs and manufacturing by keeping current tax incentives that outsource jobs.

This amendment was rejected, 21 No votes to 15 Yes votes, with only minority support. See Amendment #8 in the Appendix for the text and the roll call of votes.

Education

Stop cuts to education – amendment #10 (Lead sponsor: Rep. Honda)

This deficit-neutral amendment stops the Republican budget from cutting federal education funding for elementary, secondary, and post-secondary education services by adding \$1.9 billion – the amount by which education programs are cut below the President's 2013 request – to support key education services that bolster student achievement and support tens of thousands of teaching jobs. The amendment is fully paid for by ending unnecessary tax breaks for special interests, subsidies for big oil companies, egregious tax breaks, or tax cuts for millionaires.

A YES vote blocks the Republican cuts to education, preserving teaching jobs, helping to educate millions of elementary and secondary students, and helping students afford to go to college. A NO vote means choosing to protect tax breaks for special interests while laying off teachers and denying education services that America's school children need to be ready to compete in today's global workforce.

This amendment was rejected, 21 No votes to 13 Yes votes, with only minority support. See Amendment #10 in the Appendix for the text and the roll call of votes.

Extend college tax credits - amendment #11 (Lead sponsor: Rep. Doggett)

This deficit-neutral amendment makes the American Opportunity Tax Credit permanent to continue helping more than 9 million students afford the cost of college. The amendment is fully paid for by ending unnecessary tax breaks for special interests, subsidies for big oil companies, egregious tax breaks, or tax cuts for millionaires.

A **YES** vote will continue to help working families afford college through this partially refundable tax credit that covers up to \$2,500 of the annual cost of tuition, fees and course materials, up to a total of \$10,000. A **NO** vote allows this tax credit to expire in December, denying help to millions who are trying to obtain the education they need to succeed in a competitive, 21st century global economy.

This amendment was rejected, 20 No votes to 14 Yes votes, with only minority support. See Amendment #11 in the Appendix for the text and the roll call of votes.

Prevent the doubling of student loan interest rates – Amendment #19 (Lead sponsor: Rep. Bass)

This deficit-neutral amendment will prevent interest rates on subsidized student loans from doubling on July 1, which would increase the cost of college for nearly 7.5 million students already facing tough job prospects in the recovering economy. The amendment is fully paid for by ending unnecessary tax breaks for special interests, subsidies for big oil companies, egregious tax breaks, or tax cuts for millionaires.

A **YES** vote will lower the debt of college graduates by keeping interest rates on subsidized student loans at the current rate of 3.4 percent through June 2013. A **NO** vote means choosing to protect tax breaks for special interests while letting the interest rate on student loans double on July 1, adding an average of \$2,800 in higher loan repayment costs for millions of low- and middle-income college graduates.

This amendment was rejected, 20 No votes to 14 Yes votes, with only minority support. See Amendment #19 in the Appendix for the text and the roll call of votes.

Preserve Head Start – amendment #22 (Lead sponsor: Rep. Doggett)

This deficit-neutral amendment ensures that Head Start can continue providing vital comprehensive early childhood educational services to almost 1 million children in families at or below the poverty level. The amendment is fully paid for by ending unnecessary tax breaks for special interests, subsidies for big oil companies, egregious tax breaks, or tax cuts for millionaires.

A **YES** vote allows Head Start to continue preparing children to enter school ready to learn. A **NO** vote means choosing to protect tax breaks for special interests while leaving more than 3.7 million eligible needy pre-schoolers without access to Head Start's early educational, nutritional, and family support services.

This amendment was rejected, 21 No votes to 15 Yes votes, with only minority support. See Amendment #22 in the Appendix for the text and the roll call of votes.

Safety Net

Reject cuts to SNAP and WIC – amendment # 14 (Lead sponsor: Rep. Moore)

This deficit-neutral amendment opposes the Republicans' plan to convert the Supplemental Nutritional Assistance Program (SNAP) into a block grant and deeply reduce the program level. The only way to achieve those cuts is to throw people out of the program or reduce the benefit per person to a point where it will no longer cover a nutritionally sound diet. The amendment also provides additional funding to support the President's request for the Special Supplemental Nutrition Program for Women, Infants, and Children (WIC).

A YES vote on this amendment means opposing the SNAP cuts that would make it more difficult for low-income families to purchase an adequate diet and supporting WIC funding to allow more pregnant women, infants, and children to obtain highly nutritious food. A NO vote means favoring tax cuts for the wealthiest members of our society at the expense of protecting an important component of the safety net at the same time that citizens in nearly every State and community are facing hunger and inadequate nutrition.

This amendment was rejected, 20 No votes to 13 Yes votes, with only minority support. See Amendment #14 in the Appendix for the text and the roll call of votes.

Prohibit the privatization of Social Security – amendment #20 (Lead sponsor: Rep. Castor)

This amendment rejects Social Security privatization, a long-standing policy goal of key Republicans, including Chairman Ryan. The amendment makes clear that privatization should not be considered because it would cut benefits and increase deficits as the government has to finance private accounts and pay remaining benefits.

A **YES** vote declares that Social Security should not be privatized. A **NO** vote favors considering privatization, cutting benefits and worsening future budget deficits.

This amendment was rejected, 21 No votes to 15 Yes votes, with only minority support. See Amendment #20 in the Appendix for the text and the roll call of votes.

Child support enforcement -- amendment #21 (Lead sponsor: Rep. Moore)

This amendment expresses the sense of the House that additional legislative action is needed to ensure that States have the necessary resources to collect all child support that is owed to families and to allow them to pass 100 percent of support on to families without financial penalty; and that when 100 percent of child support payments are passed to the child, rather than administrative expenses, program integrity is improved and child support participation increases.

The amendment was agreed to by voice vote. See Amendment #21 in the Appendix for the text.

Protecting the Middle Class

Prohibit tax increases on the middle class – amendment #6 (Lead sponsor: Rep. Van Hollen)

This amendment rejects tax increases on individuals with income below \$200,000 (\$250,000 for couples). It expresses the Sense of the House that Congress should not increase tax burdens on the middle class and the poor – such as by stripping away tax benefits like the mortgage interest deduction or the child tax credit – so that Republicans can use the proceeds to give millionaires hundreds of billions of dollars in *additional tax cuts*.

A **YES** vote rejects tax increases on the middle class. A **NO** vote means choosing to protect tax breaks for the wealthy at the expense of the middle class.

This amendment was rejected, 21 No votes to 14 Yes votes, with only minority support. See Amendment #6 in the Appendix for the text and the roll call of votes.

Protect consumers against Wall Street abuse – amendment #16 (Lead sponsor: Rep. Bonamici)

This amendment expresses support for full funding of the Securities and Exchange Commission and the work of the newly created Consumer Financial Protection Bureau. Both these agencies are facing increased demands to help implement the financial reforms passed in the last Congress in response to the financial crisis that triggered a deep recession. They also play important roles in protecting investors in our securities markets and consumers of financial products.

A **YES** vote supports investors and consumers. A **NO** vote would allow banks and other financial firms to operate with less scrutiny.

This amendment was rejected, 18 No votes to 13 Yes votes, with only minority support. See Amendment #16 in the Appendix for the text and the roll call of votes.

Gas prices - crack down on oil price speculation – amendment #15 (Lead sponsor: Rep. Rvan of OH)

This amendment repeals tax subsidies to the major integrated oil and gas companies, and devotes the lion's share of the savings to deficit reduction while also funding the Commodity Futures Trade Commission (CFTC) at a level where it can properly monitor and crack down on oil price speculation.

A **YES** vote helps to reduce the deficit as well as provide the CFTC with the resources necessary to protect working families against oil speculators that could push up gasoline prices even further. A **NO** vote chooses to continue current subsidies to big oil and gas companies while doing nothing to address gas price increases or reduce the deficit.

This amendment was rejected, 20 No votes to 13 Yes votes, with only minority support. See Amendment #15 in the Appendix for the text and the roll call of votes.

Gas prices – gas price rebate – amendment #24 (Lead sponsor: Rep. Yarmuth)

The amendment repeals tax subsidies to oil and gas companies, as these are among the most profitable corporations on the planet, and instead rebates the savings to vehicle owners to ease price pressures at the pump.

A **YES** vote gives American families relief from high gas prices over giving rich oil and gas companies more tax relief when fuel prices are rising. A **NO** vote perpetuates subsidies to the biggest corporations in the world who are already making money hand over fist from cash-strapped families every time they visit the pump.

This amendment was rejected, 21 No votes to 15 Yes votes, with only minority support. See Amendment #24 in the Appendix for the text and the roll call of votes.

Protect services by restoring the Budget Control Act discretionary cap of \$1.047 trillion – reject Republican cap of \$1.028 trillion -- amendment #18 (Lead sponsor: Rep. Van Hollen)

This deficit-neutral amendment restores discretionary budget authority in 2013 to the level agreed to by the bipartisan bicameral leadership and the Administration last summer. Without this amendment, the Appropriations Committee would have to allocate the very large unspecified savings in the resolution across other programs. The Senate has already moved ahead to begin work on Appropriations at the level included in the deal. A **YES** vote retains spending at the level of the deal and allows the programmatic assumptions in the various functions to actually be achieved. A **NO** vote lowers spending well below the deal, putting numerous programs at risk, and greatly increasing the likelihood of a government shutdown later this year.

This amendment was rejected, 21 No votes to 16 Yes votes, with only minority support. See Amendment #18 in the Appendix for the text and the roll call of votes.

Reinstate Superfund Taxes to clean up contaminated sites – amendment #23 (Lead sponsor: Rep. Blumenauer)

The amendment reinstates four taxes that, until 1995, provided revenue for the Superfund Trust Fund, which finances the cleanup of contaminated waste sites across the nation.

This amendment was offered and withdrawn. See Amendment #23 in the Appendix for the text.

Deficit Reduction

End tax cuts for millionaires and impose a Buffett Rule – amendment # 7 (Lead sponsor: Rep. Yarmuth)

This amendment reduces the deficit by not extending the 2001/2003/2010 tax cuts for millionaires (including ending more generous estate tax relief for the wealthiest estates) and by imposing the Buffett Rule to ensure that middle class families do not pay higher effective tax rates than millionaires. The amendment uses all savings for deficit reduction.

A **YES** vote acknowledges that the most privileged ought to pay their fair share toward deficit reduction, and therefore lets tax cuts for millionaires expire. A **NO** vote supports permanently extending tax cuts for millionaires, paid for by cutting health care coverage for millions of individuals by ending the Medicare guarantee for seniors and cutting Medicaid support for low-income families, and by raising taxes on working Americans.

This amendment was rejected, 22 No votes to 15 Yes votes, with only minority support. See Amendment #7 in the Appendix for the text and the roll call of votes.

A balanced approach to deficit reduction – amendment #17 (Lead sponsor: Rep. Shuler)

This amendment stresses the importance of deficit reduction that draws from the entire budget – reforming defense and non-defense spending, appropriations and entitlements, and tax policies.

A **YES** vote adopts the balanced framework followed by all credible, bipartisan deficit reduction plans, including the Simpson-Bowles Commission. A **NO** vote means favoring tax cuts for the wealthiest members of our society at the expense of all other priorities.

This amendment was rejected, 15 No votes to 15 Yes votes with one Member voting present. See Amendment #17 in the Appendix for the text and the roll call of votes.

Amendment to the Chairman's Mark

Offered by Representatives Schwartz, Van Hollen, Doggett, Blumenauer, McCollum, Yarmuth, Pascrell, Honda, Ryan (OH), Moore, Castor, Bass, and Bonamici

Preventing the End of Medicare as We Know it

- 1. Strike Section 601 of the Chairman's mark and make all necessary conforming changes.
- 2. At the end of Title VI, add the following:

"Sense of the House on preserving Medicare for seniors and persons with disabilities

- (a) The House finds that---
 - (1) fifty million senior citizens and persons with disabilities rely on Medicare to guarantee their health security;
 - (2) Medicare has long been a leader in developing innovative ways to contain health care costs while protecting access to high-quality health care; and
 - (3) the Affordable Care Act of 2010 makes significant progress in modernizing Medicare and represents the United States' best opportunity to develop a framework for continual improvement in Medicare's quality, efficiency, and fiscal sustainability based on solid evidence about which policies actually work to achieve these goals.
- (b) It is the sense of that House that the Congress should not protect tax cuts for the wealthy and special interests while addressing the resulting budget deficits by making changes in law that would:
 - (1) eliminate guaranteed health insurance benefits for seniors and people with disabilities under the Medicare program;
 - (2) increase costs for seniors and people with disabilities by establishing a Medicare voucher or premium support plan that provides limited payments to Medicare beneficiaries to purchase health care in the private health insurance market; or
 - (3) weaken the traditional Medicare program and cause it to wither away, by diverting the healthiest enrollees into private plans and undermining traditional Medicare's ability to control costs while offering access to a broad range of providers."
- 3. Amend the committee report to reflect the following policy assumptions:

The resolution supports the sense of the House that Medicare is a highly successful program that provides health security to 50 million senior citizens and disabled individuals, and that it should not be subject to any changes in law that would eliminate the Medicare guarantee of a specific set of health benefits, increase costs for seniors by converting Medicare into a voucher or premium support program, or weaken the traditional Medicare program.

 - (3) repeal of the Affordable Care Act would take away these important benefits and increase out-of-pocket costs for seniors by hundreds or thousands of dollars.
- (b) It is the sense of that House that the important benefits for seniors provided by the Affordable Care Act, including the gradual closing of the prescription drug coverage gap, coverage of key preventive services and annual wellness visits with no co-pays or deductibles, better coordinated care for chronic diseases, expanded support for alternatives to nursing homes, and protections against abuse for nursing home residents should not be repealed."
- 2. Amend the committee report to reflect the following policy assumptions:

The resolution rejects repeal of important benefits for seniors provided by the Affordable Care Act, including the gradual closing of the prescription drug coverage gap, coverage

 - (1) According to CBO, between 1979 and 2007, real after-tax incomes for the top 1 percent of income earners grew 278 percent or a stunning \$973,100 per household; whereas real after-tax incomes of the middle 20 percent of families grew just 25 percent and incomes of the poorest 20 percent increased just 16 percent.
 - (2) According to the U.S. Census Bureau, American families lost ground even during the 2000s as median incomes slipped 4.8 percent in real terms between 2000 and 2009.
- (b) It is the sense of that House that this resolution should not allow taxes to be raised on net on any individual with adjusted gross income below \$200,000 or any married couple with adjusted gross income below \$250,000. Raising taxes on working families while slashing spending on the services that benefit them all for the purpose of providing millionaires with trillions of dollars in *additional* tax cuts could have serious negative consequences, including the following:
 - (1) unduly burdening the finances of working families, making it even harder for them to make ends meet;
 - (2) reducing consumer spending, which will greatly weaken economic growth and cost the economy millions of jobs over the coming years;

- (3) weakening or eliminating tax incentives like the Earned Income Tax Credit and the refundable component of the Child Tax Credit that promote work and family, resulting in diminished levels of employment and worsened economic outcomes for child-raising particularly for those families at the lowest rungs of the economic ladder;
- (4) eliminating incentives in the tax code that support financing and owning a home, hurting all homeowners and kicking the housing industry when it is already down;
- (5) eliminating employer-sponsored health insurance coverage by weakening or eliminating the exclusion of employer contributions for medical insurance premiums and medical care;
- (6) making the tax code more regressive and further widening the income gap between the wealthiest households and the middle class.

The resolution rejects policies favoring tax cuts for the wealthiest members of our society at the expense of protecting access to long-term care and other critical health care services for senior citizens, persons with disabilities, low-income children and their families, and other vulnerable groups of people who rely on the health care safety net provided by Medicaid.

The resolution rejects any policy that would cut long-term care benefits for seniors and persons with disabilities, and it affirms that state governments should not reduce long-term care for seniors as a way to control Medicaid spending. The resolution further rejects any policy that would sever the connection between Medicaid funding and the

actual costs of necessary services used by seniors, persons with disabilities, and low-income children and families, including policies to convert Medicaid into a block grant or to impose a federal cap on Medicaid funding.

Such policies do not represent reform, because they do nothing to reduce health costs. Rather, such policies would inevitably lead to a dramatic cut in health care support for people who depend on Medicaid, imposing serious financial hardship on them and their families. Seniors and persons with disabilities would be at particular risk of hardship under such a proposal, because they account for two-thirds of Medicaid spending, and would therefore be a likely focus of service cuts to comply with a capped funding level.

The resolution notes, further, that:

- a) much of the spending for seniors and persons with disabilities is for long-term care;
- b) Medicaid pays for nearly half (43 percent) of all long-term care provided in the United States, including nursing homes and home- and community-based supports that many seniors need and want as an alternative to expensive institutional care; and
- c) at least 70 percent of persons over age 65 will likely need long-term care services at some point.

The resolution accommodates the level of health care funding necessary to protect long-term care services for seniors and persons with disabilities, along with important health services for low-income children and other groups helped by Medicaid, by reducing or eliminating the following: the Section 199 deduction for domestic production activities for the major integrated oil companies; egregious tax breaks such as tax deductions for corporate jets; loopholes in our international corporate tax system that encourage the outsourcing of manufacturing and result in fewer American jobs to support the middle class; and additional tax cuts for those with adjusted gross incomes above \$1 million annually.

In addition, Pell grants and other federal support for access to higher education helps to ensure that all students have access to the further education and training required in a 21st century workforce.

The resolution accommodates this necessary level of education funding by reducing or eliminating the following: the Section 199 deduction for domestic production activities for the major integrated oil companies; egregious tax breaks such as tax deductions for corporate jets; loopholes in our international corporate tax system that encourage the outsourcing of manufacturing and result in fewer American jobs to support the middle class; and additional tax cuts for those with adjusted gross incomes above \$1 million annually.

Protect Women from Discrimination in Health Care

1. At the end of Title VI, add the following:

"Sense of the House on Protecting Women's Equal Access to Comprehensive, Affordable, Quality Health Care"

- (a) The House finds that---
 - (1) according to the Centers for Disease Control, one out of seven women has no reliable, source of health care;
 - (2) women are denied coverage because of "pre-existing conditions" such as having had a C-section or having been a victim of domestic violence;
 - (3) insurance companies charge women more than men for coverage, a practice known as gender rating. According to a recent study, women on the individual market are charged as much as 85% more than men for coverage;
 - (4) only 6% of individual market insurance plans include maternity coverage in states where it is not mandated;
 - (5) the Affordable Care Act (ACA) protects women by banning insurance companies from denying coverage and charging them higher premiums than men.
 - (6) the ACA stops insurance companies from dropping coverage because of pregnancy or breast cancer.
 - (7) the ACA ensures that maternity services are covered by insurers in the individual and small group markets; and
 - (8) the ACA provides women in new health plans coverage of important preventive services at no cost-sharing.
- (b) It is the sense of the House that insurance companies should not deny women insurance coverage or charge them more. All women should have the right to access the

full range of health services they need. The Affordable Care Act strengthens and protects this right. It is further the sense of the House that Congress should not make laws that interfere with a woman's ability to make her own health care decisions.

2. Amend the committee report to reflect the following policy assumptions:

The resolution assumes full implementation of the Affordable Care Act and other applicable laws assumed in the baseline estimates prepared by the Congressional Budget Office that protect and further strengthen the right of all American women to have equitable access to the full range of health services.

Consumer Protection and Wall Street Watchdogs

- 1. At the end of Title 6, add the following new section:
 - "Sense of the House on Consumer Protection and Wall Street Watchdogs.
 - (a) The House finds that:
 - (1) the Consumer Financial Protection Bureau was created by the Dodd-Frank Wall Street Reform and Consumer Protection Act of 2010;
 - (2) the Bureau is an important component of the country's response to the financial crisis and recession;
 - (3) the Bureau's role as part of the Federal Reserve System and reliance on funding from the Fed's operations helps give it important independence from efforts to interfere with its important mission and activities; and
 - (4) the Bureau has overcome efforts to obstruct its operations and begun to play a critical role in protecting student loan borrowers, older Americans, service members, and other consumers.

(b) The House finds that:

- (1) the Securities and Exchange Commission (SEC) plays an important role in overseeing our securities markets and protecting investors;
- (2) effective oversight and investor protection is critical to ensuring that markets function effectively, allowing firms to raise capital;
- (3) the Commission is facing a challenge and increased workload in helping to implement the Dodd-Frank Wall Street Reform and Consumer Protection Act of 2010;
- (4) the President's Fiscal 2013 Budget proposed increases of \$245 million in gross budget authority and \$170 million in gross outlays for the SEC;

- (5) SEC spending is completely offset by fees and charges authorized by section 31 of the Securities Exchange Act of 1934; and
- (6) increases in SEC funding would thus be fully offset having no impact on the Federal budget while increasing investor confidence in the integrity of our financial markets.
- (c) It is the sense of the House that Congress should
- (1) support the work of the Consumer Financial Protection Bureau as well as its governing and financing structures, and
- (2) support the President's proposed increase in funding for the Securities and Exchange Commission."
- 4. Amend the committee report to reflect the following policy assumptions:
 - (a) The resolution assumes that the President's request for the Securities and Exchange Commission is fully funded. The Commission's mission is critically important in the aftermath of the financial crisis in order to protect the economy, the financial system, and investors from the impact of financial fraud and crimes. The SEC also faces significant challenges and expense in implementing the provisions of the Dodd-Frank Wall Street Reform and Consumer Protection Act of 2010. The resolution assumes that these increases will be fully offset by the SEC's fee collections, thus having no impact on the deficit.
 - (b) The resolution includes language supporting the work of the Consumer Financial Protection Bureau, including its governing and financing structure

"Sense of the House on Social Security Privatization

- (a) The House finds that----
 - (1) Social Security is America's most important retirement resource, especially for seniors, because it provides an income floor to keep them, their spouses and their survivors out of poverty during retirement benefits earned based on their past payroll contributions;
 - (2) in January, 55.5 million people relied on Social Security;
 - (3) Social Security benefits are modest, with an average annual benefit for retirees of less than \$15,000, while the average total retirement income is less than \$26,000 per year;
 - (4) diverting workers' payroll contributions toward private accounts undermines the social safety net by subjecting the workers' retirement decisions and income to the whims of the stock market;
 - (5) diverting trust fund payroll contributions toward private accounts jeopardizes Social Security because the program will not have the resources to pay full benefits to current retirees; and
 - (6) privatization increases federal debt because the Treasury will have to borrow additional funds from the public to pay full benefits to current retirees.
- (b) It is the sense of that House that Social Security privatization is fiscally irresponsible and would put the retirement security of seniors at risk, and that any Social Security reform legislation shall reject partial or complete privatization of the program that includes private accounts funded by current payroll taxes."

The resolution assumes that any Social Security reform legislation rejects privatization proposals, because the diversion of payroll contributions and reliance on the financial markets undermines the federal budget and the social safety net.

The resolution assumes the reinstating of four taxes that, from 1981 through 1995, provided revenue to the Superfund Trust Fund. This fund, subject to appropriation, finances the cleanup of hazardous contaminated sites in those cases in which the parties found liable for the contamination no longer exist, cannot clean up the site, or refuse to undertake a cleanup. The four taxes are three dedicated excise taxes (one for petroleum, a second for chemical feedstocks, and a third for imported substances made from hazardous chemicals) and an environmental corporate income tax. The resolution assumes that the four taxes will be reinstated effective January 1, 2013, and will sunset on December 31, 2022.

Presently, the Superfund Trust Fund is financed out of general federal revenues. However, reinstating these taxes to provide revenue for the fund will restore the nexus that parties who benefit from the manufacture and sale of substances found in hazardous waste sites should contribute to the cost of cleanup. In addition, reinstating these taxes will provide a stable, dedicated source of funding for the trust fund and alleviate the need for using general revenues for this purpose. The resolution maintains the requirement that Congress appropriate funding from the trust fund.

The resolution assumes that the taxes will be reinstated at the rates that were in effect when the taxes expired in 1995. The excise tax on domestic crude oil and imported petroleum products will be reinstated at a rate of 9.7 cents per barrel. The excise tax on the production of certain hazardous chemicals will be reinstated at a rate that varies from 22 cents to \$4.87 per ton. In addition, the resolution assumes the reinstating of an environmental income tax on corporations equal to 0.12 percent of the amount by which a corporation's modified alternative minimum tax exceeds \$2 million.

Protect all American Women's Access to Contraceptive Services

1. At the end of Title VI, add the following:

"Sense of the House on Protecting Access to Affordable Contraception Services for All American Women

- (a) The House finds that---
 - 1) contraception helps women avoid unintended pregnancy and improve birth spacing, which results in substantial, positive consequences for infants, women, families, and society;
 - 2) contraceptive services have long been recognized by government bodies and a wide range of other experts, including leading health care professional organizations, as a vital and effective component of preventive and public health care:
 - 3) unintended pregnancy in the United States is higher than in other developed countries, and contraceptive use is lower -- whereas 49% of pregnancies in the United States are unintended, the corresponding percentage in France is only 33%, and in Edinburgh, Scotland, it is only 28%;
 - 4) 98% of sexually active American women have used a contraceptive method at some point in their lives;
 - 5) family planning was designated one of the top 10 public health achievements of the 20th century by the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention; and
 - 6) the Affordable Care Act provides 20 million American women with preventive health care services, including contraception, without cost-sharing requirements.
- (b) It is the sense of the House that no woman should be denied access to contraceptives. The Affordable Care Act ensures ongoing access to critical preventive services that enable women to make important personal choices about family planning without regard to cost burdens."
- 2. Amend the committee report to reflect the following policy assumptions:
 - The resolution assumes full implementation of the Affordable Care Act and other applicable laws assumed in the baseline estimates prepared by the Congressional Budget Office that protect the right of all American women to access critical preventive health care services, including contraceptives.
